<u>Goals & Objectives</u>

The Girls Got GRIT (GGG) Mentorship Program at Sacred Hearts Academy inspires and prepares the next generation of female leaders by connecting high school students with professional mentors and internship companies to enhance skill development and build a professional network. By uniting the Academy's young women with inspirational local leaders and companies, Girls Got GRIT is retaining valuable talent and creating a pipeline for workforce development in Hawaii.

Vision

It takes a village to raise a child. This timeless quote reflects the power of relationships in child development because human connection is the foundation of individual and communal growth. The transition from high school to college and then into the workforce is naturally uncomfortable and challenging. Application into the program (Sept-Oct) :

Students submit applications and references to earn one of the prestigious positions on a GGG mentorship team. Student participants must meet the following criteria to apply and remain in the GGG Program:

- Be a Sophomore or Junior at Sacred Hearts Academy
- Have and maintain a 3.0 GPA
- Provide one reference letter from a faculty member or administrator
- Complete a permission form completed by parent or guardian
- Write a one-page essay on a designated topic
- Commit time for Tuesday lunch workshops and afterschool internships/team meetings

Mentorship Phase (Jan – Apr):

Two professional women, from a variety of business sectors, volunteer to mentor a team of five students during the spring semester. Mentors work directly with their team and meet an average of 1 hour per week to build relationships and guide them through a project. From inspiration to implementation, each group creates a unique business proposal based on an annual topic and the students learn how to present their proposal to potential investors.

In April, each mentor hosts a "Presentation Day" where the students present their project to a group of invited business leaders who are given the opportunity to financially invest in the success and expansion of the overall GGG program and scholarship fund.

Internship Phase (Summer and/or Fall Semester Aug - Dec)

GGG partners with companies to provide students with short-term internships during the summer and/or fall semester (August- December). Students intern at two companies, once a week for eight sessions each. These internships are on Wednesday or Friday afternoons or at an agreed upon schedule during the summer. The experience provides shadowing, career discernment and professional networking opportunities.

Weekly Workshops (throughout the schoolyear)

In addition to powerful mentorships and internships, students also participate in workshops every Tuesday during their lunch recess. These workshops cover topics to teach and reinforce skills that ensure success and longevity in their professional and personal lives. By the conclusion of the both phases, students will gain increased emotional intelligence, an established professional network and a functional physical and digital resume.

Girls Got GRIT Scholarship Fund

The Girls Got GRIT Scholarship Fund was established by foundress, Shelley Cramer, General Manager of Saks 5th Avenue. The scholarship provides two Sacred Hearts students \$5000 each for educational expenses and is transferable to college.

Applications are distributed in January and collected at the end of February.

History of Sacred Hearts

Sacred Hearts Academy is Hawaii's largest all-girls' school and was founded in 1909 by the Sisters of the Sacred Hearts. The School's mission is to develop each student to become a contributing member of society by offering a quality curriculum within a Christian environment.

The student body consists of approximately 900 students in grades Pre-Kindergarten-12; students come from all areas of the island of Oahu and several foreign countries. Academy students mirror the ethnic, religious, economic and social diversity of the islands. Many have Asian and Pacific Island backgrounds, and a significant number of families belong to the military. The Academy's student body is diverse in every way except gender.

Many Academy students are first generation private school attendees and college attendees. Although many of the Academy's students come from lower income families, they are able to attend the school because of its scholarship and financial aid programs. Approximately 44% of our students receive financial support, enabling them to thrive and receive an outstanding education with 100% of them going on to college.

The School has been recognized for outstanding 21st century learning and is a National School of Character. The Academy's students commit to 60,000 hours of community service to non-profit organizations each year. The Academy has been successful in instilling within students a strong work ethic and an inner drive to contribute and better their community. Sacred Hearts has been successful in providing its students with an integrated curriculum that focuses on development of both mind and heart.

The Academy is committed to empowering and educating adolescent girls. The Mentorship Program provides a jump start to this process for the young women.

Support for programs such as GGG, that assist girls envision their career goals, are key to continued progress in helping girls live up to their full potential. It is through networking, training, resources and financial support that mentors can help develop the potential of girls as they navigate the path from dream to reality.
